It's been over seven years since Abhayagiri Monastery and Portland Friends of the Dhamma, planted a seed – a trial monastery outside White Salmon, Washington – then watched to see if it would take root and grow. Happily, people were inspired enough to offer the necessary daily and long term support.

Reflecting on this process, Ajahn Sudanto has watched the Hermitage grow from seed to seedling, and now likens it to a sturdy sapling. With the property now paid for and with continued support, we hope to see this sapling gradually mature over time into a great shade tree, one that will provide a canopy of Dhamma, inspiration and refuge for a great many people.

There was a marked sense of ease and friendship at the 2017 Pah Bah, with the many families and children adding a special joy and richness. The event and the many volunteers just seemed to flow and work seamlessly together.

2017 Budget Was Smaller

The 2017 budget was about 30% less than last year's, mostly because the property was paid off in 2016. Now the budget focuses on providing for the monks' simple living expenses, normal costs of owning property and some land and structure improvements.

Donations also were down this year, but they were adequate to meet Hermitage expenses and help maintain prudent reserves for future improvements and long-term plans.

Several Projects Completed in 2017

The Hermitage was able to complete several great improvements this year. Some of them greet you as you drive in.

Across the bridge, you'll find a lovely redesigned planted area, a small deck in front of the outdoor Buddha shrine, new outdoor bench seating and a larger parking area near the house.

There's also a new lawn near the guest kuti and the hillside has been stabilized and made more attractive by a partial rock wall, a planting ledge and transplanted ferns. More irrigation was added that will help keep these areas beautiful.

Wildfire prevention work (tree removal, low limbs removed and underbrush cleared) continued and will be an on-going effort. Any help would be welcome!

Sanghata is working with Ajahn Sudanto to develop plans for an Abbot's Kuti and a long-range vision and plan for the property.
